## **AURORA COUNTY COMMISSIONER PROCEEDINGS**

## October 16, 2025

The meeting was called to order at 9:00 AM by Chairman Clyde Dethlefsen with John Paul Studeny, Randy Niles, Roger Hanten, and Travis Clark present.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

There was no public input.

The agenda was amended by adding senior citizen meals and executive session as per SDCL 1-25-2(1). A motion was made by Studeny, seconded by Clark to approve the agenda as amended. Motion carried all voting aye.

A motion was made by Clark, seconded by Hanten to approve the minutes of the October 2<sup>nd</sup> meeting. Motion carried all voting aye.

The Board of County Commissioners set the date for the next biannual county employee meeting for Thursday, November  $6^{th}$  at 7:30 AM.

Chairman Dethlefsen reminded the Commission that Aurora County will be holding the South East Central District meeting on November 12<sup>th</sup> at 1:15 PM.

Chairman Dethlefsen asked Commissioner Niles if he has been attending the ROCS meetings every month.

Randy said yes and that there is one coming up very soon. Dethlefsen asked Niles to get more clarification on what the senior meals cost. He noted the report the Commission received a while back does not add up and the charge per meal is extremely high. Dethlefsen also reported he has been told that the Stickney Senior Center will not be making meals on Fridays in order to cut expenses. He said the Friday meals will be prepared on Thursday and will be delivered on Thursday as well. Commissioner Niles will report back to the Board at the next regular commission meeting.

Highway Superintendent Doug Vissia and Secretary Nancy Beckman were present for the highway report.

A motion was made by Clark, seconded by Studeny to authorize the highway department employees to attend a 2-hour defensive driving training on October 23<sup>rd</sup> in Mitchell that is sponsored by Safety Benefits. Motion carried all

voting aye. Nancy stated that they are offering two sessions that day, so half the employees will attend a course at 9:00 AM and the second group at 1:00 PM.

A motion was made by Studeny, seconded by Niles to authorize Highway Secretary Nancy Beckman to attend the annual safety & loss control conference in Pierre on November 12<sup>th</sup> & 13<sup>th</sup>, which is sponsored by Safety Benefits. Motion carried all voting aye.

A motion was made by Niles, seconded by Hanten to surplus the 2013 John Deere scarifier. Motion carried all voting aye. Discussion was held on whether to sell it online through the government surplus site, by sealed bids or offer it to other governmental entities. Highway Superintendent Vissia and Auditor Urban will go over the options and review the bid laws.

At the last meeting, Highway Superintendent Vissia informed the Commission that Greg Kroupa was not going to be able to honor his commitment on the motion/agreement that was made back in October of 2024. The motion that was made was to have Kroupa haul gravel from his own pit at \$6.00/ton with no charge for hauling or labor. The work was to be done on 7 miles of road in Patten Township. Since Kroupa is unable to supply the hauling and labor, the Commission talked about some other options to explore. One option is to pay \$5.00/ton since the county did the hauling and labor. Highway Secretary Beckman reported that the highway department hauled 106 loads in two days. Another option was to pay Kroupa the \$6.00/ton and have Kroupa compensate the county for the hauling and labor. The Commission directed Highway Superintendent Vissia to talk with Kroupa to see what he would be willing to do.

Discussion was held on getting rock from Gerrit Overweg that was paid for in 2021. Chairman Dethlefsen said we need to figure out how many truckloads of rock we have there and see if maybe we need to hire someone to haul it. Secretary Beckman confirmed that there is approximately 2,000 tons left to get. Superintendent Vissia said Gerrit calls us when he has some ready, but we just have not been able to get down there to get it as we have been busy hauling gravel in Patten Twp. Commissioner Hanten said we need to get the rock hauled as soon as possible. Even if we need to hold off on hauling gravel in Patten Township for a few days, said Hanten, just get it done, The Commission directed Superintendent Vissia to call Gerrit Overweg and check when he is available to get it loaded for the county.

Superintendent Vissia reported on the pre-construction meeting held last week for the replacement of the Jackrabbit Road Bridge. He said that work may start within the next couple of weeks. Vissia said once they start on it, the bridge and road will be closed until all the work is complete. Which means it will be closed this winter, said Vissia. Chairman Dethlefsen directed the highway department to put something in the papers to notify residents of when it will be closed.

Auditor Urban informed the Commission that the National Association of Counties (NACo) has asked counties throughout the United States to participate in Operation Green Light. She explained that Operation Green Light is a way to show support for our veterans by shining a green light on government buildings such as the county courthouse. This year is the 5<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Operation Green Light, said Urban. In the past we have had one green light displayed in front of the courthouse, stated Urban. This year we would like to expand that by adding more green lights to shine on our beautiful memorial in front of the courthouse and pass a proclamation for Operation Green Light. I think this is the least we can do to show support for our veterans, stated Urban. A motion was made by Clark, seconded by Hanten to approve the Proclamation for Operation Green Light. Roll Call Vote: Clark, aye; Studeny, aye; Hanten, aye; Niles, aye; Dethlefsen, aye. Motion carried.

## OPERATION GREEN LIGHT FOR VETERANS PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, the residents of Aurora County have great respect, admiration, and the utmost gratitude for all the men and women who have selflessly served our country and this community in the Armed Forces; and

WHEREAS, the contributions and sacrifices of those who served in the Armed Forces have been vital in maintaining the freedoms and way of life enjoyed by our citizens; and

WHEREAS, Aurora County seeks to honor individuals who have made countless sacrifices for freedom by placing themselves in harm's way for the good of all; and

WHEREAS, veterans continue to serve our community in the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, religious groups, civil service, and by functioning as County Veterans Service Officers to help fellow former service members access federal health, disability and compensation benefits each year; and

WHEREAS, approximately 200,000 service members transition to civilian communities annually; and an estimated 20 percent increase of service members will transition to civilian life in the near future; and

WHEREAS, studies indicate that 44-72 percent of service members experience high levels of stress during transition from military to civilian life; and

WHEREAS, active military service members transitioning from military service are at a high risk for suicide during their first year after military service; and

WHEREAS, the National Association of Counties encourages all counties, parishes and boroughs to recognize Operation Green Light for Veterans; and

WHEREAS, Aurora County appreciates the sacrifices of our United States military personnel and believes specific recognition should be granted;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, with designation as a Green Light for Veterans County, Aurora County hereby declares November 4-11, 2025, as a time to salute and honor the service and sacrifices of those transitioning from active service; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that in observance of Operation Green Light, Aurora County will honor our Veterans by shining a green light on our veterans memorial; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Aurora County encourages its citizens in patriotic tradition to recognize the importance of honoring all those who made immeasurable sacrifices to preserve freedom by displaying green lights in a window of their place of business or residence from November 4-11, 2025. He noted that the life expectancy for the current landfill holes is 20 plus years. Studeny reported the tonnage was down from a year ago, but the expenses were also down, so it was basically a wash.

A motion was made by Niles, seconded by Studeny to enter into executive session as per SDCL 1-25-2(1) for personnel at 10:32 AM. Motion carried. The Chairman declared the Commission out of executive session at 11:07 AM with no official action taken.

A motion was made by Clark, seconded by Hanten to file reports and pay bills as listed below. Motion carried all voting aye.
